Altenbrauch Farm has 62 acres of wooded hills and open fields for you to explore. Our residence and personal belongings are all contained in one area, so please feel welcome to explore the rest of the property and set up camp wherever you like.

RULES

Please read and abide by the few simple rules listed on the back of this sheet. They've been put in place for the safety and enjoyment of our guests, as well as the stewardship of our property.

MAP

You're free to camp anywhere on the property. The included map shows the property boundaries. The location of the self-check-in kiosk, portajohn, solar shower, and firewood rack is labelled. Portable fire rings, shovels, folding tables, and items for sale are also available there.

WATER & SOLAR SHOWER

An outdoor water spigot is located by the check-in kiosk. Be sure to lift the handle all the way vertical; the water may take a few seconds to begin flowing. A primitive solar shower is located beside the water spigot. The water is heated by the sun, so it only allows for 10-15 minutes of heated water at a time. Follow the instructions posted inside the shower stall. The water is shut off November 1 to March 30 to avoid freezing.

FIREWOOD & CAMP STORE

Dead wood found on the ground may be gathered for campfires, but seasoned, split firewood is also available for \$5 per bundle. Fire starter cubes, lighters, colored flame packets, tent stakes, and more are available the "Camp Store" cabinet, located on the right side of the firewood rack.

Altenbrauch Farm can be reserved as a private venue for special events and weddings—please speak to us if you have an event in mind. If you have questions or need assistance of any kind, feel free to stop by our house or send a text. Otherwise, we'll leave you alone to enjoy your stay.

CAMPGROUND RULES

THE GOLDEN RULE IS "LEAVE NO TRACE"

PLEASE FEEL WELCOME TO:

- Explore and set up camp anywhere on our property.
- Drive to and park at your site. Please drive along the field edges to minimize damage and keep them looking nice.
- Burn dead wood found on the ground, or purchase firewood at the rack. Aside from firewood, there are also some souvenirs and other merchandise available for sale.
- Borrow the fire rings, shovels, water buckets, tables, and cooking grates by the firewood rack, but please return them before leaving.

PLEASE DO NOT:

- Leave trash at your site. It must be taken with you. Pick up bottle caps and cigarette butts. Trash bags are provided at the check-in kiosk.
- Make loud noise, play loud music, use generators, or leave vehicles running after 10 p.m. Please be considerate of other campers and neighbors.
- Burn the log seating around the fire rings or trash other than paper and food items. Only burn dead wood found on the ground. Do not burn batteries, cans, or bottles.
- Cut down standing trees, dead or alive. Use only dead wood found on the ground.
- Make carvings in rocks or trees.
- Drive through the middle of the fields. Please drive along the edges to minimize damage.
- Drive on the hill trails during wet weather. They are not graveled and are meant to be driven on for campsite access only when the ground is dry.
- Leave children, pets, or burning campfires unattended.
- Set up camp in front of the portajohn/firewood rack area or within 50 feet of another camping group. There are 62 acres, please spread out!
- Set up at a glamping tent, camping shelter, or cabin for which you do not have a reservation.
- Trespass onto neighboring properties outside the boundaries shown on the map.
- Swim, use fireworks, guns, offroad vehicles, or chainsaws due to insurance restrictions.

A minimum \$50 damage/cleanup fee per occurrence will be charged to you through the booking platform for cut trees, carved rocks, trashed sites, burned seats, etc.

LOCAL DIRECTIONS

State parks and forests:

Hocking Hills State Park/Hocking State Forest—15-minute drive

Drive north on Bray Hollow Road, then turn left onto Locust Grove Road (the road name will change to Potter Ridge in Hocking County). Look for Le Petit Chevalier Vineyards & Farm Winery on your right. Continue following the road until it ends at State Route 56, then turn left. The park is just a short drive down the road. Ash Cave is on the right, just beyond the State Route 374 intersection. Take 374 to get to 664, where you'll turn left to visit Old Man's Cave or turn right to get to Logan and more tourist destinations.

Lake Hope State Park/Zaleski State Forest/Moonville Rail Trail/Shea-Williams Nature Preserve—30-minute drive

Drive south on Bray Hollow Road, turn left onto Goosecreek, and take another left onto Curry and follow it to U.S. Highway 50 and turn left. Follow the highway through McArthur and then turn left onto State Route 677 a few miles outside town. This will take you to the middle of the small village of Zaleski, where you'll turn left onto State Route 278. The road goes right through the middle of both the state park and forest. The shooting range, lake, dining lodge, and iron furnace are all on the left. The Hope Schoolhouse Welcome Center and Moonville Tunnel are off Wheelabout Road, on the right.

Lake Rupert/Wellston Wildlife Area—20-minute drive

Drive south on Bray Hollow Road, turn left onto Goosecreek and follow it to the small village of Allensville. Turn left onto U.S. Highway 50, then make a right onto State Route 683. The lake is a few miles up the road.

Lake Alma State Park—30-minute drive

Drive south on Bray Hollow Road, turn left onto Goosecreek and follow it to the small village of Allensville. Turn left onto U.S. Highway 50, then make a right onto State Route 683. Follow it to State Route 93 and turn right. Continue through the village of Hamden and turn left onto State Route 349 at the third railroad crossing.

Tar Hollow State Park/Tar Hollow State Forest—30-minute drive

Drive south on Bray Hollow Road, turn left onto Goosecreek and follow it to the small village of Allensville. Turn right onto U.S. Highway 50. Turn right onto State Route 671, then right onto 327, then left onto Tar Hollow Road.

Nearest towns:

Allensville—10-minute drive Cross Creek General Store, Dollar General, Nichols' Carry-Out

Drive south on Bray Hollow Road, turn left onto Goosecreek and follow it to the small village of Allensville. If you turn left onto U.S. Highway 50, Cross Creek will be on the right. If you turn right, Dollar General will be on the left.

McArthur—15-minute drive

Hotel McArthur Welcome Center, Campbell's Market, dollar stores, banks, fast food and dine-in restaurants, and gas stations

Drive south on Bray Hollow Road, turn left onto Goosecreek, and take another left onto Curry and follow it to U.S. Highway 50 and turn left. Campbell's Market will be on the right, just outside McArthur.

Logan—35-minute drive

Hocking Hills Welcome Center, boutique shopping, Walmart, dine-in and fast-food restaurants, banks, gas stations

Drive north on Bray Hollow Road, then turn left onto Locust Grove (the road name will change to Potter Ridge in Hocking County). Follow this road until it ends at State Route 56, then turn right and stop at the caution light. Cross traffic does not stop at this intersection! Turn left onto State Route 93 and follow it to Logan.

Chillicothe—40-minute drive

Hopewell Culture National Historical Park, Walmart and other shopping, dine-in and fast-food restaurants

Drive south on Bray Hollow Road, turn left onto Goosecreek and follow it to the small village of Allensville. Turn right onto U.S. Highway 50 and follow it to U.S. Highway 23 North.

Athens—50-minute drive

Ohio University, boutique shopping, Walmart, dine-in and fast-food restaurants

Drive south on Bray Hollow Road, turn left onto Goosecreek, and take another left onto Curry and follow it to U.S. Highway 50 and turn left. Follow the highway through McArthur and beyond (visit Raccoon Creek Outfitters on your left!) until you hit the four-lane intersection. Turn left to stay on 50, which will take you to Athens.
